## **Background Investigations**

Descriptor Code: 5.118

Issued Date: 10/1/2015

To ensure the safety and welfare of students and staff, the district shall require criminal history background checks and fingerprinting of applicants for teaching positions and any other positions that require proximity to children. Any costs incurred to perform these background checks and fingerprinting shall be paid by the applicant. The Board shall reimburse the applicant if the position is offered and accepted.

Background checks shall be required of employees at least once every five (5) years after the date of hire.<sup>3</sup> The Board shall reimburse the employees for any costs incurred to perform these background checks and fingerprinting.

#### USE AND DISSEMINATION<sup>4</sup>

Fingerprints or other approved forms of positive identification shall be submitted with all requests for criminal history record checks for non-criminal justice purposes.<sup>5</sup> The director of schools shall ensure the Originating Agency Identifier number is on file at all times.

Tennessee and FBI Criminal History Record Information (CHRI) obtained by the district shall be solely used to verify criminal violation(s) and shall not be disseminated. Results shall be considered confidential and only accessible to district personnel identified by the director of schools. CHRI shall only be accessed by authorized personnel in the performance of their duties and shall never be released to the public.

All persons directly associated with the accessing, maintaining, processing, dissemination or destruction of CHRI must sign an awareness statement and shall indicate that they have been specially trained on the subject. The training shall provide those with access to criminal history record information with a working knowledge of federal and state regulations and laws governing the security and processing of criminal history information. The director of schools is responsible for ensuring that authorized personnel receive such training within 60 days of employment or job assignment and every three years.

#### RETENTION AND SECURITY

The Director of Schools shall develop procedures to ensure CHRI is stored in a secure location. Areas in which CHRI is processed and handled shall be restricted to authorized personnel identified by the Director of Schools. The area shall be out of the view of the public and unauthorized personnel. The Director of Schools shall maintain a list of all employees who have access to, can process, disseminate, and/or destroy CHRI.

#### **DISPOSAL OF CHRI**

When CHRI is no longer needed, it shall be destroyed by burning, shredding or other method rendering the information unreadable. Record destruction must be conducted under the supervision of the director of schools.

#### **MISUSE**

Employees who misuse CHRI or violate this policy shall be subject to disciplinary action that may result in loss of access to records, loss of employment, or criminal prosecution. Any employee with knowledge of misuse shall immediately report a violation to the director of schools.

# Reconsideration of Instructional Materials and Textbooks

Because opinions differ, there may be questions concerning some instructional and library materials despite the quality of the selection process. If a complaint is made, the following procedure is to be followed:

1. Inform complainant of the selection procedures and make no commitments.

2. Request the complainant to submit a formal "Request for Reconsideration of Instructional Materials."

3. Inform the principal (and other appropriate personnel).

4. Keep challenged materials available for use during the reconsideration process.

 5. Upon receipt of the completed form, the principal requests review of the challenged materials by an ad hoc materials review committee within fifteen (15) working days, and notifies the appropriate supervisor and director of schools that such review is being done. The review committee is appointed by the principal, and includes certificated library media personnel, representatives from classroom teachers, one or more parents, and may include one or more students.

6. The review committee shall take the following steps after receiving the challenged materials:

a. Read, view or listen to the material in its entirety;

- b. Check general acceptance of the material by reading recognized and evaluative reviews;
- c. Determine the extent to which the material supports the curriculum;
- d. Complete the appropriate "Checklist for Reconsideration of Instructional Materials," judging the material for its strength and value; and
- e. Present recommendation to principal for further action and to the director of schools for purposes of information.
- 7. If the complainant desires further action after receiving the recommendation of the committee and the decision of the principal, an appeal may be made to the Board.

Grading System

The appraisal of a student's life at school is the most constructive factor in the establishment of good home-school relations. Effectiveness in interpreting the quantity and quality of each child's work will influence parental attitudes toward the school and its program. Reports are made to parents at least six times a school year and use is made of the recognized methods that tend to make the task meaningful and reliable.

 The Director of Schools shall develop an administrative procedure to establish a system of grading and assessment for evaluating and recording student progress and to measure student performance in conjunction with Board-adopted content standards for grades K-8.<sup>1</sup> The grading/assessment system shall follow all applicable statutes and rules and regulations of the State Board of Education.<sup>2</sup> The grading/assessment system shall be uniform district-wide at comparable grade levels except that the director of schools shall have the authority to establish and operate ungraded and/or unstructured classes in grades K-3.<sup>3</sup>

The Director of Schools shall submit a copy of the grading, reporting and assessment systems to the Board before the system is implemented.<sup>4</sup> These guidelines shall be communicated annually to students and parents/guardians.<sup>1</sup>

Conduct grades are based on behavior and shall not be deducted from scholastic grades.

#### GRADES NINE - TWELVE GRADING SCALE AND LOTTERY SCHOLARSHIPS<sup>5</sup>

Schools teaching grades nine through twelve shall use the uniform grading system established by the State Board of Education. Using the uniform grading system, students' grades shall be reported for the purposes of application for post-secondary financial assistance administered by the Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation.<sup>1</sup>

Each school counselor shall provide incoming freshmen with information on college core courses required for lottery scholarships as well as necessary criteria (grade point average, ACT and SAT score, etc.) that must be met in order to receive a scholarship.

Seniors may apply for the Tennessee HOPE Scholarship by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA is available at the guidance office or online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. The priority date for FAFSA completion is May 1.

Elementary school counselors should explain the HOPE Scholarship and its requirements to their students and impress upon them the benefits of making good grades.

#### LOTTERY SCHOLARSHIP DAY

Each school year, prior to scheduling courses for the following school year, schools teaching students in grades 8-11 shall conduct a lottery scholarship day for students and their parents.<sup>6</sup>

#### UNIFORM GRADING SYSTEM

The Weakley County School System sets percentage ranges for letter grades in accordance with state standards.

Progress in Grades K - 5 shall be derived each six weeks in the following manner:

- a. 1/3 = Tests (Daily, Weekly, Six Weeks)
- b. 2/3 = Daily Work (Homework, Class Work, Projects, etc.)

Kindergarten student progress in all academic subjects shall be reported as Satisfactory, Unsatisfactory, Improving, or Needs Improvement.

Grades one (1) and two (2) student progress shall be expressed as numerical grades for Reading, Math, Language Arts, and Spelling beginning with the first six weeks. All other subjects, i.e., Science, Social Studies, Art, Music, Health, Writing, Physical Education, and Safety, shall be reported as Satisfactory, Unsatisfactory, or Improving, but not yet satisfactory.

Grades three (3) through five (5) student progress shall be expressed as numerical grades. Art, Music, Writing, Health, Physical Education and Safety shall be reported as Satisfactory, Unsatisfactory, or Improving, but not yet satisfactory.

Grades six (6) through twelve (12) regular academic and comprehensive career and technical student progress shall be expressed as numerical grades (except 6, 7, & 8 grade music) each sixweek or nine-week grading period according to the table below:<sup>7</sup>

#### FRAMEWORK OF STANDARDS FOR HONORS COURSES

Honors courses will substantially exceed the content standards, learning expectations, and performance indicators approved by the State Board of Education. Teachers of honors courses will model instructional approaches that facilitate maximum interchange of ideas among students: independent study, self-directed research and learning, and appropriate use of technology. All honors courses must include multiple assessments exemplifying coursework (such as short answer, constructed-response prompts, performance-based tasks, open-ended questions, essays, original or creative interpretations, authentic products, portfolios, and analytical writing). Additionally, an honors course shall include a minimum of five (5) of the following components:

- 1. Extended reading assignments that connect with the specified curriculum.
- 2. Research-based writing assignments that address and extend the course curriculum.
- 3. Projects that apply course curriculum to relevant or real-world situations. These may include oral presentations, power point presentations, or other modes or sharing findings. Connection of the project to the community is encouraged.
- 4. Open-ended investigations in which the student selects the questions and designs the research.
- 5. Writing assignments that demonstrate a variety of modes, purposes, and styles.
  - Examples of mode include narrative, descriptive, persuasive, expository, and expressive.
  - Examples of purpose include to inform, to entertain, and to persuade.
  - Examples of style include formal, informal, literary, analytical and technical.
- 6. Integration of appropriate technology into the course of study.
- 7. Deeper exploration of the culture, values, and history of the discipline.
- 8. Extensive opportunities for problem solving experiences through imagination, critical analysis, and application.
- 9. Job shadowing experiences with presentations which connect class study to the world of work.

All course types which meet the above framework will be classified as honors, eligible for additional percentage point and GPA point weighting.

#### FINAL EXAMS, TCAP, AND END-OF-COURSE TESTING

#### 1. Testing

- The testing results of final exams, TCAP, and End-of-Course grades in all subjects will be factored in as 15% of the student's second semester grade average, in compliance with the State Board of Education in accordance with Tennessee Code Annotated §49-1-302(2) and §49-1-617.
- The End-of-Course exams will count as the final exam in grades 9 12 in those courses that apply.
- Students in grades 9-12 may be excused from course final exams (except End-of-Course) if they have demonstrated exemplary grades and attendance. This exemption policy is published in the Weakley County Student Handbook.

#### 2. Attendance

- Students with excused absences shall make up standardized tests upon their return to school.
- Students with **unexcused absences** shall receive an exam grade of "zero" on the exam.

#### 3. TCAP and End-of-Course Exam Conversions

• Raw score conversions for TCAP and End-of-Course exams are based on guidelines developed by the Tennessee Department of Education. The cut score conversions will follow the cube root method.

Before an employee is suspended s/he shall be: (1) provided with written notice, including the reasons for the suspension along with an explanation of the evidence; (2) given an opportunity to respond to the director at a recorded conference, if requested within five (5) days; and (3) given a written decision of the suspension within ten (10) days. Both parties may be represented by counsel at the conference, which shall be recorded.

The director of schools may dismiss or suspend for more than three days any non-tenured teacher during the contract year for incompetence, inefficiency, insubordination, improper conduct or neglect of duty after giving the non-tenured teacher, in writing, due notice of the charges.

The director of schools shall give the non-tenured teacher an opportunity for a full and complete hearing before an impartial hearing officer.<sup>3</sup>

hearing. The employee may appeal the decision to the Board within ten (10) working days of the hearing officer rendering the written decision to the employee.

Written notice of appeal to the Board shall be given to the director of schools. Within twenty (20) days on receipt of notice, the director shall prepare a copy of the proceedings; transcript, documentary and other evidence presented and provide the Board a copy of the same.

The Board shall hear the appeal. No new evidence shall be introduced. The non-tenured teacher may appear in person or be represented by counsel and argue why the decision should be modified or reversed. The Board shall take one of the following actions:

- 1. Sustain the decision:
- 2. Send the record back if additional evidence is necessary; or
- 3. Revise the penalty or reverse the decision.

Before any decision to dismiss is made, a majority of the membership of the Board shall concur in sustaining the charges. The Board shall render a decision on the appeal within ten (10) working days after the conclusion of the hearing.

The director of schools shall also have the right to appeal any adverse ruling by the Hearing Officer in same manner as the non-tenured teacher.

Within twenty (20) days after receipt of notice of the decision of the Board, either party may appeal to the chancery court in the county where the school system is located. The Board shall provide the entire record of the hearing to the court.

#### **NONRENEWAL**

Non-tenured teachers are subject to the same rules and regulations and are entitled to the privileges of employment enjoyed by tenured teachers except that they have no claim upon continuing employment or tenure protections.

The principal is responsible for discussing deficiencies as part of the evaluation process with the non-tenured teacher and providing assistance for overcoming these deficiencies.

The director of schools is under no obligation to re-employ non-tenured teachers at the end of their contract period. If the director of schools determines not to renew the contract of a non-tenured teacher, <sup>1</sup> the following action shall be taken:

1. The Board shall be notified at the next regular board meeting; and

2. Written notice of non-renewal shall be **sent** to the teacher within five (5) business days following the last instructional day, which is defined as the last day of the regular school year for students. The written notice of nonrenewal must be sent by certified mail or overnight carrier to the teacher's physical mailing address on record with the LEA or transmitted via electronic mail to the email address used by the LEA to communicate

with the teacher.4 If the reason for nonrenewal is due only to the loss of funding for the position, then the notice shall include a statement listing it as the cause for nonrenewal.<sup>5</sup>

#### RESIGNATION

A teacher shall give the director of schools notice of resignation at least thirty (30) days before the effective date of the resignation. A teacher, who fails to give such notice, in the absence of justifiable extenuating circumstances, shall forfeit all tenure status. The Board may waive the thirty (30) days notice requirement and permit a teacher to resign in good standing.

The conditions under which it is permissible to break a contract with the Board are as follows:

- 1. The incapacity on the part of the teacher to perform the contract as evidenced by the certified statement of a physician approved by the Board;
- 2. The release by the Board of the teacher from the contract which the teacher has entered into with the Board.<sup>6</sup>

Any teacher on leave shall notify the director of schools in writing at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of return if the teacher does not intend to return to the position from which he/she has taken leave. Failure to render such notice may be considered a breach of contract.<sup>7</sup>

 Upon a breach of contract, the Board, upon a motion recorded in its minutes, may file a complaint with the Commissioner and request the suspension of a teacher's certificate. After the Commissioner has provided the teacher an opportunity for defense during a hearing, the Commissioner may suspend the certificate for no less than thirty (30) and no more than three hundred sixty-five (365) days.<sup>8</sup>

#### RETIREMENT

Retirement shall mean a termination of services under conditions which will allow the employee to draw benefits from retirement plans and/or social security benefits.

Employees eligible for retirement benefits may elect to retire at any age according to the provisions of the retirement system.

Central office personnel shall assist employees in securing retirement benefits; however, it shall be the responsibility of the retiring employee to provide verification of eligibility in writing from TCRS to the central office. It shall be the responsibility of the retiring employee to file for benefits.

Employees who retire under TCRS may be employed up to one hundred twenty (120) days per year without loss of retirement benefits. Retired teachers may substitute teach for an additional ninety (90) days if the director of schools certifies in writing to the Board that no other qualified personnel are available to substitute teach.<sup>9</sup>

The director of schools may employ teachers retired for at least one year for full-time employment as a kindergarten through twelfth grade teacher on a year-to-year basis. Retirement benefits will not be lost or suspended under certain conditions, which include but are not limited to the following: 10

- 1. The director of schools of the employing system must certify in writing that no other qualified individuals are available to fill the position;
- 2. The Commissioner of Education must certify that the employing school system serves an area that lacks qualified teachers to serve in the position to be filled;
- 3. The retired teacher must hold a valid license and shall not be entitled to tenure status;
- 4. The retired teacher shall not be eligible to accrue additional retirement benefits, accrue leave or receive medical insurance coverage; and
- 5. The salary paid to the retired member shall not be less than the rate of compensation set by the Board for teachers with no experience filling similar positions, nor more than eighty-five percent (85%) of the rate of compensation set by Board for teachers with comparable training and years of experience filling similar positions.

#### **ELECTRONIC MEDIA**

#### ACCESS AND ACCEPTABLE USE FOR STUDENTS AND STAFF

The Weakley County Board of Education supports the privilege of students and staff (hereafter called users) to have reasonable access to various information formats and believes it incumbent upon users to use this privilege in an appropriate and responsible manner.

The Weakley County Board of Education intends to: (a) prevent user access over its computer network to, or transmission of, inappropriate material via Internet, electronic mail, or other forms of direct electronic communications; (b) prevent unauthorized access and other unlawful online activity; (c) prevent unauthorized online disclosure, use, or dissemination of personal identification information of minors; and (d) comply with the Children's Internet Protection Act [Pub. L. No. 106-554 and 47 USC 254(h)].

To the extent practical, technology protection measures (or "Internet filters") shall be used to block or filter Internet access to inappropriate information. Specifically, as required by the Children's Internet Protection Act, blocking shall be applied to visual depictions of material deemed obscene or child pornography, or to any material deemed harmful to minors. Subject to staff supervision, technology protection measures may be disabled for adults or, in the case of minors, minimized only for bona fide research or other lawful purposes. Specifically, as required by the Children's Internet Protection Act, prevention of inappropriate network usage includes unauthorized access, including so-called 'hacking,' and other unlawful activities; and unauthorized disclosure, use, and dissemination of personal identification information regarding minors. It shall be the responsibility of all members of Weakley County Schools' staff to educate, supervise and monitor appropriate usage of the online computer network and access to the Internet in accordance with this policy.

A written parental request shall be required prior to the student being granted independent access to electronic media involving district technology resources. The Parent and Student Acknowledgement Card delivered with this handbook shall serve as parental agreement to student access to electronic media.

Access is a privilege, not a right, and entails responsibility. Users are responsible for good behavior using school technology resources. Communications on the network are public in nature. General school rules for behavior and communications apply.

When using electronic media, students, staff and teachers should understand:

- 1. The Technology Department must approve the installation of all hardware and software.
- Malicious attempts to harm or destroy hardware, software, or data are prohibited. Destruction of
  hardware or software is vandalism and will be addressed according to the discipline policy of Weakley
  County Schools.
- 3. The illegal installation or transmission of copyrighted materials is prohibited.
- 4. All files and messages are subject to review by Weakley County Schools personnel.
- 5. Materials that are obscene, offensive, threatening, or otherwise intended to harass or demean recipients should not be transmitted.
- 6. Private, commercial, or illegal use is prohibited.
- 7. Files, data, or information of others must not be improperly accessed or misused.
- 8. Backup copies of documents are the responsibility of the user.
- 9. Personal information should never be given on the Internet except in the performance of the business of Weakley County Schools.
- 10. Everyone has the responsibility to take precautions to prevent the spread of software viruses.

In order to modify or rescind the agreement to access electronic media the parent or guardian (or the student who is at least 18 years old) must provide the school principal with a written request.

School officials shall apply the same criterion of educational suitability used to review other educational resources when questions arise concerning access to specific databases or other electronic media.
